Dear EGOSians,

I welcome you wholeheartedly and most warmly to the 39th EGOS Colloquium in the captivating region of Sardinia! It fills my heart with joy to meet you all in Italy, a country that – alongside Austria – holds a special place in my heart. I am delighted that we can gather in the charming setting of Cagliari, a vibrant city perched on a hill with breathtaking views of the sea from every angle.



This year, our Colloquium revolves around the theme of “Organizing the Good Life: Between Legacy and Imagination”. I can understand the fascination with a topic that resonates so deeply with Sardinian culture. In Cagliari you will understand what good life means, simply by experiencing the citizens’ kind and relaxed attitude. Over the past years, I have witnessed the remarkable ability of the local organizers to stage our Colloquium and giving life to its theme: namely, respecting the legacy of our scholarly “format” and sustaining imagination in pushing forward the sustainability and inclusivity agenda.

Astonishing! I believe that such counterintuitive ideas stemming from the imagination of new futures can assist us in addressing these pressing issues.

I am thrilled by the enthusiastic response we have received, making this Colloquium the largest we have ever had, with over 3,000 papers submitted across over 70 sub-themes. GENERAL THEME

Since Aristotle and Plato, the notion of good life has been at the forefront of philosophical thinking. What does good life mean in the context of organizations? And how can organizations promote a good life?

Contemporary managers and leaders are increasingly striving to construct wellbeing at work, while Fortune lists have emerged that rank organizations in terms of 'best places to work'. Organizational scholars, on their part, have increasingly investigated such themes as work life balance, positive organizational scholarship, the link between organizing and employees' emotional wellbeing, CSR, and the conceptualization of organizations as purpose-driven institutions. Good life also emerges as a collective construct that encompasses community resilience and progress, social equality and inclusion, climate change and preservation of biodiversity.

These trends demonstrate the importance of constructing organizations as loci as well as vehicles of good life. However, the same trends can lead to the manipulation of collective behaviors and the engineering of convenient cultures.

The purpose of the 39th EGOS Colloquium 2023 is to understand the organizing of a good life as the encounter of legacy and imagination. The former refers to an organization's ability to build on its own history and to respect the cultural values of the social contexts in which they operate. The latter refers to an organization's capacity to build better futures through continuous innovation. To gain such an understanding, several questions come to mind:

- How can we design workplaces that promote imagination and wellbeing?
- How can organizations reconcile profit-making with the wellbeing of their communities?
- How can the engineering of good life in organizations lead to dysfunctional consequences?
- How do we theorize legacy and imagination in organization studies?
- How can legacy promote imagination, innovation, and competitive advantage?
- How can legacy encourage sustainability, inclusion, and ethics?
- Under what conditions does legacy promote change/rigidity?
- How does legacy contribute to or detract from building a good life?
- How does legacy differ across cultures?
- What are the benefits and shortcomings of imagination?

The EGOS Colloquium 2023 will be hosted in Cagliari (Italy), a city with a millenary history, culture, and wild nature. A territory where tensions between past and present, nature and progress, physical and virtual, local and global/international become more evident as they shape Sardinians' daily life.

These contradictions between legacy and contemporary demands have fostered original thinking, creativity, innovative use of traditional resources. Imagination is translated not only into superb gastronomic tastes and entrepreneurial initiatives but also in building a virtuous ecosystem to redevelop abandoned areas. This is the case of the conversion of Sulcis mines into the production of the spirulina algae, a unique project created by the close collaboration between local firms and the university.

In this context, the University of Cagliari, established in 1620, plays a central role in preserving the past, protecting the environment, stimulating vivid imagination through

multidisciplinary, and nurturing entrepreneurial mindsets. The philosophy of the University of Cagliari appears simple and challenging at the same time: “We should not limit ourselves to the present, but we should reinvent the past to build a better future.”

We welcome EGOSians to Cagliari to rethink the good life between legacy and imagination!

The established agenda of diversity and inclusion with its concomitant discussions of symbolic diversity policies and measurable diversity statistics remains dominant, despite recent years. The Covid pandemic, the resurgence of Black Lives Matter protests, and the waves of #MeToo all testify to persistent structural inequalities and discrimination, that foreground intersectionalities of gender, race, class, and disabilities to name a handful. Current social movements, then, help us question the assumed progress of mainstream diversity and inclusion initiatives. While such initiatives are, undoubtedly relevant, necessary, and needed, they also (re-)produce tensions, complications, and regressions. The narrative of success and the sole emphasis on individual performances, in particular, enable backlash to current social movements expressed, for example, by #NotAllMen and #AllLivesMatter, that challenge struggles for radical change, recognition, and equality.

This sub-plenary will feature four presentations which will in turn set out the concept of collegiality and its significance in higher education, present findings from an international project which has been studying various aspects of collegiality, and then provide some reflections on how notions of collegiality offer alternative perspectives for organizing within and beyond the academy. On this latter point, we will return to previous organizational theorizing that has considered universities as metaphors for organizing lives and consider how we may learn to live in more collegiate ways. SUB-PLENARY 1-2 – From Studying the Established to Shaping the Institutions of the Future

When: Thursday, July 6, 2023, 16:00–17:30 CEST

Fitting with the overall Colloquium theme “Organizing for the Good Life: Between Legacy and Imagination”, this sub-plenary explores the tension between ‘legacy and imagination’ as a tension between “institutionalization” and “design”.

In classic institutionalist works, institutions are commonly intended as what is established, accepted as legitimate, even taken for granted. Institutional scholars have studied change of institutions as either an emergent and incremental process, or as mainly punctuated and revolutionary. In most cases, the process is conceived as highly path dependent, although favored by “institutional entrepreneurship” or ‘institutional work’. Only in rare cases, a more imaginative stance has been taken, considering the possibility of analyzing “untaken paths” (Schneiberg, 2007), learning from institutional collapses (De Cock et al., 2021), “institutional bricolage” (Delmestri, 2007) and other types of ‘disciplined imagination’ (Gümüşay & Reinecke, 2022) as an inspiration for shaping the institutions of the future.

Organization design models may also help, especially the (not so frequent) generative models of design (e.g., Hatchuel et al., 2011; Grandori & Furnari, 2008; Soda & Furnari, 2012) in reasoning on “unbuilt” but possible organizational and institutional devices and forms. Hence, as basic inputs for discussion we think at presentations centered on “untaken paths” in institutionalist perspectives; and on ‘unbuilt organizations’ in organization design perspectives; plus empirical presentations on experiences in actually shaping future institutions and organizations and/or contributions on suitable methods for doing so in an empirically grounded way: for example, case studies on outlier arrangements; field quasi-experiments or pilot experiences; reports on existing but unrealized project; studies on institutional failures, lost paths, and leveraging on counterfactual history for hypothesizing future paths.

SUB-PLENARY 1-3 – In Search of New Organizational Models for Energy Transition towards Sustainability

When: Thursday, July 6, 2023, 16:00–17:30 CEST

Where: Campus Magistero, Building Aggiunto, Floor 1, Room Capitini

This sub-plenary will combine academic and practitioner’s presentations to discuss the concept of the energy transition. Four renowned organizational and technology scholars will suggest ways in which organizational and processes innovation may facilitate the transition to cleaner energy.

The sub-plenary will also feature a ground-breaking project on the “Green electrification of Sardinia; promoted by Enel, Roma Tre University, and the University of Cagliari. This initiative, which aims at decarbonising the island and developing renewable energy, has been included in the Multi-Stakeholders Energy Compact of the United Nations and is considered a model for the spread of electrification and the energy transition worldwide.

Our intention is to engage the audience in a discussion of how academia and industry can collaborate in pursuing solutions to environmental and societal challenges.

In the big data and artificial intelligence era, everything seems more predictable and easier to get. At the same time, more than ever, environmental, political, and societal challenges (Ferraro et al., 2016) have transformed uncertainty into the new norm. In the Energy sector, the contingent gas and oil market crisis (following the Covid-19 pandemic crisis and the Russia–Ukraine war), as well as the current global commitment to a transition to cleaner energy have triggered deep transformations (Markard et al., 2012). In this context, operators should continue to be resilient, with a special focus on the ability to adapt culturally to contexts characterised by constant changes and uncertainty.

With this sub-plenary, we aim to deepen the conversation among organizational and technology scholars, to better understand how to organize for energy transition. Different theoretical perspectives on multiple topics will be explored.

SUB-PLENARY 1-4 – Retrospection and Projection in Generating Better Pasts and Futures

When: Thursday, July 6, 2023, 16:00–17:30 CEST

Where: Campus Economia, Building B, Floor 0, Room A

The purpose of this sub-plenary is a dialogue on perspectives on how constructions of the past and the future shape the futures we actually create and how we evaluate them. This approach recasts understandings of legacy and imagination from a present point of view as questions of retrospect and projection, looking back and looking forward. We treat the contrasts of “past: future”, and “retrospection: projection” as orthogonal, so that imagined pasts and legacy futures are of equal interest as more conventional alignments.

This sub-plenary focuses on two central issues:

- a dialogue about concepts that join the past to the future, from identity, reputation and strategic capabilities; to design processes, entrepreneurial projects and cultural narratives, to the structuring of political and economic resources; and
- the concrete practices of how futures take on reality so that processes of retrospect and projection are not detached cognitive hypotheticals but deeply embedded in organizational and societal practices and structures.

Rather than focusing on a specific field of study or on specific dimensions of ‘the good life’, this sub-plenary is designed to survey the theoretical landscape of contemporary scholarship related to temporal agency and find common ground as well as points of divergence. To this end, the session brings together four prominent scholars with long-standing expertise and extensive knowledge of work on legacy and imagination: Jens Beckert, Davide Ravasi, Violina Rindova, and Roy Suddaby. While their work emphasizes different temporal orientations (future–history) and is grounded in different disciplines (from sociology, to strategy, to organization theory) and phenomena (from identity and reputation to entrepreneurship and capitalist systems), each panelist has also developed groundbreaking theoretical perspectives that offer starting points for the dialogue. Each panelist will outline a point of view of central concepts and questions and then engage with the others.

SUB-PLENARY 2-1 – Genealogies of Care and a New Legacy of Wellbeing in Management and Organization Studies: A Decolonial Perspective

When: Friday, July 7th, 2023, 16:00–17:30 CEST

Where: Campus Economia, Building A, Floor -1, Room 1

During the summer of 2020, protest movements calling for racial justice spread across the United States and inspired solidarity movements in more than 60 countries across the world. Several major corporations also endorsed Black Lives Matter and pledged to combat racism and end discrimination in the workplace. In the United Kingdom, the Black Lives Matter movement forced a public reckoning with the country's legacies of slavery and colonialism. Statues, plaques and other memorials that paid tributes to slave traders and colonialists have been removed and buildings, schools and streets renamed across the country.

There were also calls to decolonize higher education and the curriculum, a movement that first began in South Africa in 2015. Indigenous communities in the settler colonies of the Americas, Australia, Canada, and New Zealand are demanding a similar reckoning and dismantling of colonial institutions, compensation and return of lands. The fulfillment of such requests and the recognition of Indigenous knowledge are also essential to address the ecological crisis. This is now part of our collective memory and the beginning of an emerging genealogy of care within the academy.

Genealogies produce historical knowledge of struggles, activated by local knowledges that exist at the heart of all human and more-than-human experiences. These alternate knowledges are often subjugated and de-legitimized by circuits of power that establish a dominant discourse. In this sub-plenary, panelists will draw from their shared genealogy of experience to explore decolonization as part of a process that seeks to build a new legacy of wellbeing within management and organization studies.

To establish this decolonial story within the emergent genealogy we have put together a diverse panel of senior scholars and early career researchers who will explore questions such as:

- What does decolonization mean for EGOS and the academy?
- In what ways do colonial legacies inform our research and teaching?
- How can a decolonial imagination challenge the dominant Eurocentric view of management and organization studies?
- What would a decolonial research agenda for management and organization studies entail?

The panelists are invited to reflect on the “legacies” of work inherited from the past and are encouraged to “imagine” the future of work, reflecting on the new normality of good work in the post-Covid-19 era and providing us with new tools and perspectives to imagine better work conditions.

SUB-PLENARY 2-3 – Organizing Industries, Ecosystems, and Markets: Between Legacy and Imagination

The aim of this sub-plenary is to engage the audience in a thoughtful reflection about these new scenarios, discuss possible ways in which former research and legacy approaches can help us make sense of these new trends, and identify new, imaginative avenues for future research to understand and theorize about industries, ecosystems, and markets.

The sub-plenary will feature a group of expert international scholars which have extensively investigated the topics. The goal is to bring together some regular members of the EGOS community with other scholars less familiar, which, despite internationally renowned and working on highly complementary topics, have been less exposed to the EGOS community.

Phenomena such as global warming, migrations, wars, social conflicts, pandemics, have challenged industries to re-think their nature, activities, and competitive approach, as well as the way in which firms create, deliver, and capture value – thus combining legacy approaches with novel, imaginative solutions. Companies and industries have recently been called into action to collectively combine their business objectives with purposes to support community resilience and progress, social equality and inclusion, climate change and preservation of biodiversity. The fast-paced and interdependent nature of technological development, the pervasiveness of digitalization and the related rising complexity have provided both challenges and opportunities to firms and policy makers. Scholars have suggested that understanding the growing complexity that binds together the success and failure of various interrelated organizations requires a broader lens on industries, accounting even more than before for partnerships, network, relations, thus expanding our approach to broader ecosystems of market and non-market actors (Adner & Kapoor, 2010; Jacobides et al., 2018).

At the same time, in our role as editors, we sometimes feel hard pressed finding reviewers willing to accept the task. And yet as authors, we all need reviews to grow our papers and see them through the reviewing process. Interestingly, we're the same person in different roles over time, and we experience these conflicting needs and associated emotions in a sort of (milder) version of schizophrenia.

- **Train Connections from the Airport**

- **Climate**
Expect warm and sunny weather in Cagliari in July, with temperatures ranging between 29 and 32 degrees Celsius.
- **Electricity and Telephony**
The standard voltage is 230 volts
The telephone prefix is +39.
- **Time zone**
Cagliari is in the Central European Summer Time Zone (CEST)
- **Business hours**
 - Shops are usually open on Monday – Saturday from 9:00 to 20:00. Usually there is a lunch break from 13:00 to 16:00.
 - Supermarkets are usually open from 9:00am to 21:00 all days of the week, usually without lunch breaks.
- **Restaurants**
Restaurants are normally open for the lunchtime (12:30 – 15:30) and dinners (19:00-22:00). Bars (coffee shops) are usually open from 7:30 am to 20:00.
- **Tipping**
Tipping is usually already included in the bill (you can find it in your bill under the name “Coperto”, it varies from 1 to 3 EUR). However, your reward for personnel is always welcome. The amount of tipping usually lies around 5-10%.
